All in all, good times were had, balls were hit, and the awards and prize money were doled out according to plan. Now that Friday was over, it was time to rest and wait for the big kahuna: Saturday's tournament.

The second night, Nov. 18, was for the public. Joola was yet again plastered everywhere the eye could see as 25 players, which included several members of the Corpus Christi Table Tennis Association and Del Mar's own Santiago Le Gall, took to the gym and went for the trophy and some money as well.

And took to the gym they did, taking seven hours to resolve two rounds of play. If that seems long, it was originally supposed to be nine hours and require three rounds of play to determine the winners.

Though he didn't win, the timing seemed

to have been just right for participant Mark Arnold.

The tournament was fundamentally an afternoon devoted to playing table tennis for hours on end, but there was more to it. It was a marriage of the old and new, a combination of seasoned veterans and novices joining for a leisurely game, all with some prizes tied to it as well.

"Having it back at Del Mar is just wonderful to see," Arnold said.

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
