Texas A&M-Kingsville has selected Omar Gonzalez as the next head coach for the 2023-2024

This news comes after the departure of former-Johnny Estelle, who is moving on to now be the assistant coach of the University of North Texas Men's Basketball team.

Gonzalez spent 2014-2017 as a graduate assistant while earning his master's degree at TA-MUK before eventually becoming the Assistant Coach in the 2018-19 sea-


"I am absolutely honored and thrilled to be in the position of Head Coach," Gonzalez said. "It's bittersweet because I get to continue and honor what I want to do and help young men but now I have to do it without Coach Estelle."

Gonzalez has been in the coaching circuit for a decade and has spent the last five seasons building a strong team at TAMUK, posting a 56-26 record since arriving as the assistant coach for Estelle. This includes a third appearance in the NCAA Tournament in four years as an assistant.

During his first tenure in Kingsville, Gonzalez helped guide the Javelinas and improve from eight total wins in his first year to 11 in his second season.

Year three would see the team explode for 19 victories, including a record of 10-8 in the Lone Star Conference, which would stand for TAMUK's highest win total in conference since the 1995-96 season. Gonzalez took a year

selections along with two All-Defensive team selections as well.

"It's a big opportunity for both of them," forward Kavon Booker said. "It's coach Gonzalez's first coaching job and now he gets to show what he can do."

For nearly a full decade, TAMUK has seen elevated play from its men's basketball team and its coaches. Now, as the 17th head coach in program history, Gonzalez must take the reins and lead at the front with a new assistant at his side.

In the final stretch of the season, the team finished with a record of 5-7, however, in three of the seven losses they were decided by no more than two points. To add to this, in the first game of the series against number two ranked Angelo State, the Javelinas came out and stunned the team by defeating them with a score of 9-8.

the final game, the future is not set for the Javelina baseball team, but Head Coach Jason Gonzales remains hopeful for what is yet to come.

Bonuz also helped the Javelinas gain a 2-0 lead early on against A&M International, "logging singles and advancing into scoring position," per Javelina Athletics.


